While you are out on clinical rotations you <u>MAY</u> be exposed to communicable diseases, chemotherapeutic agents, immunizations, or other unforeseen hazards. You are expected to familiarize yourself with the rotation specific institutional policies for exposure to hazards, as well as universal precautions or other accepted general precautions for exposure to disease or hazards.

If you are exposed to contagious disease(s) or hazardous material(s) you should follow the Occupational Exposure Instructions that have been provided to you. These instructions are also posted in the ELMS Document Library in the Rotation Information and Forms section.

Students are responsible for the cost of any healthcare and/or medical treatment that may be needed or required while on rotations. These risks apply to all students. Students who are or may become pregnant during the semester when enrolled in courses with clinical rotations have additional risks to consider to both the unborn child and the mother. Nursing mothers may have increased risk to their infants.

### Occupational Exposures
